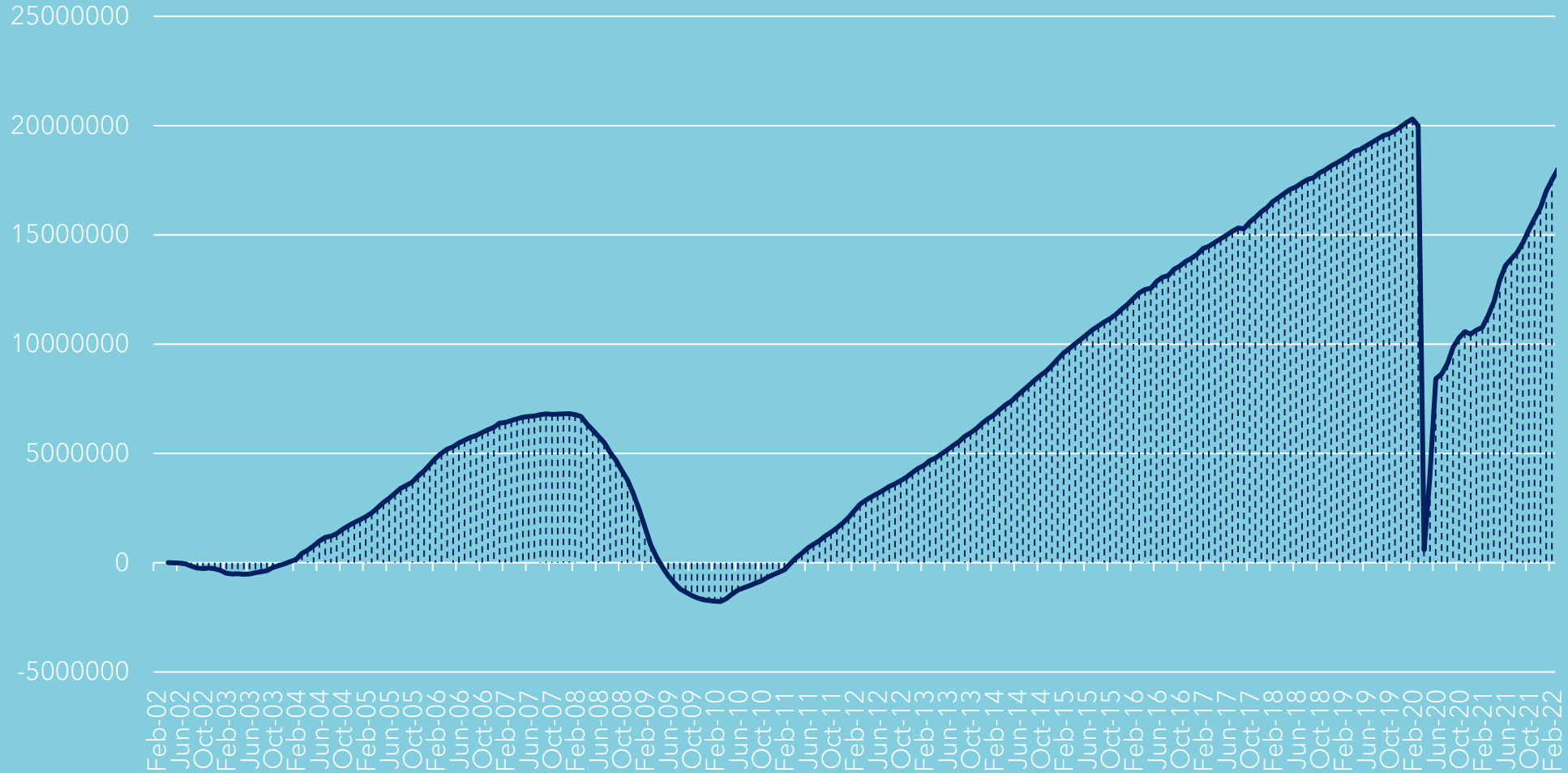

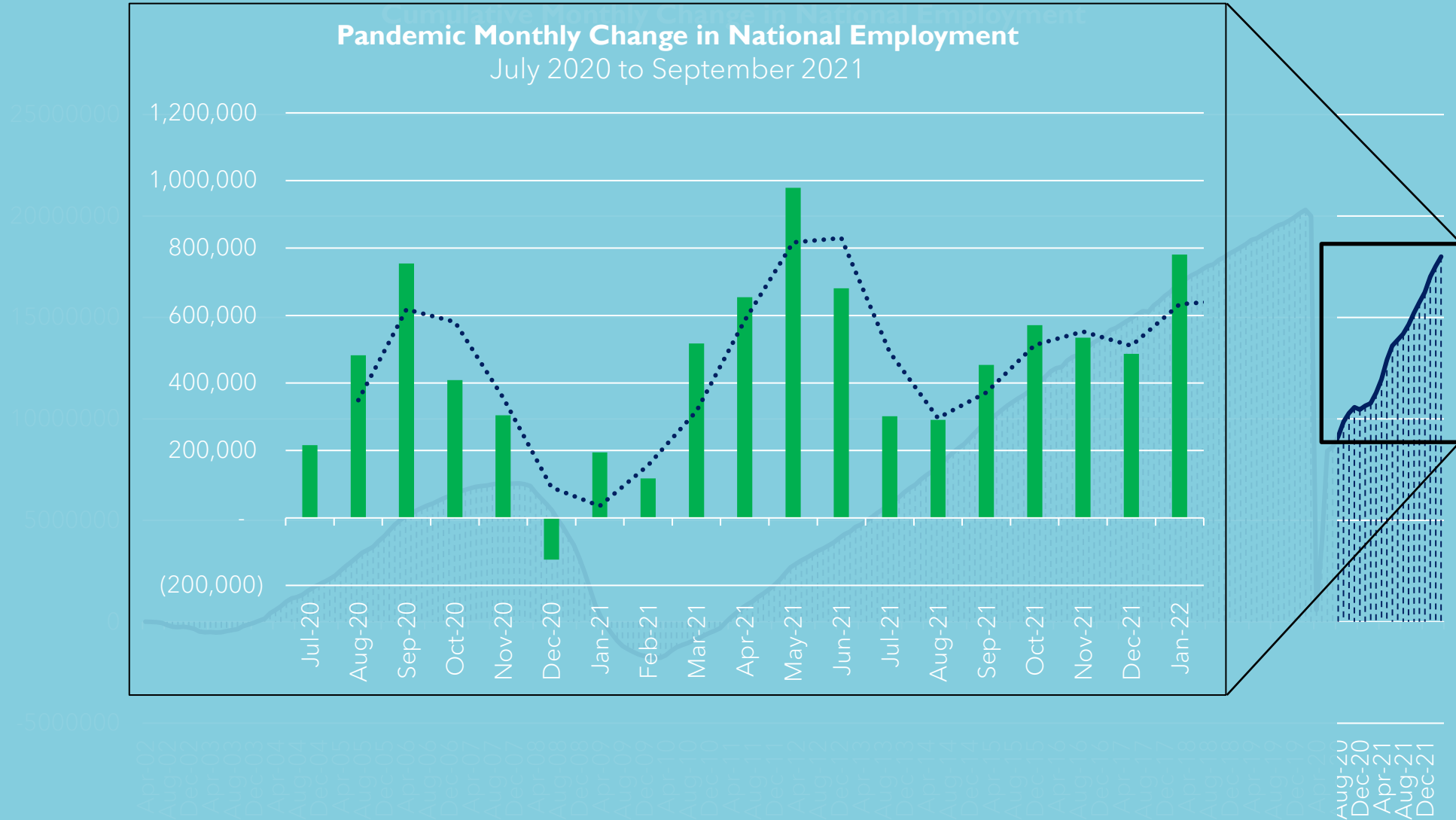
COVID-19 Employment Impact

Cumulative Monthly Change in National Employment



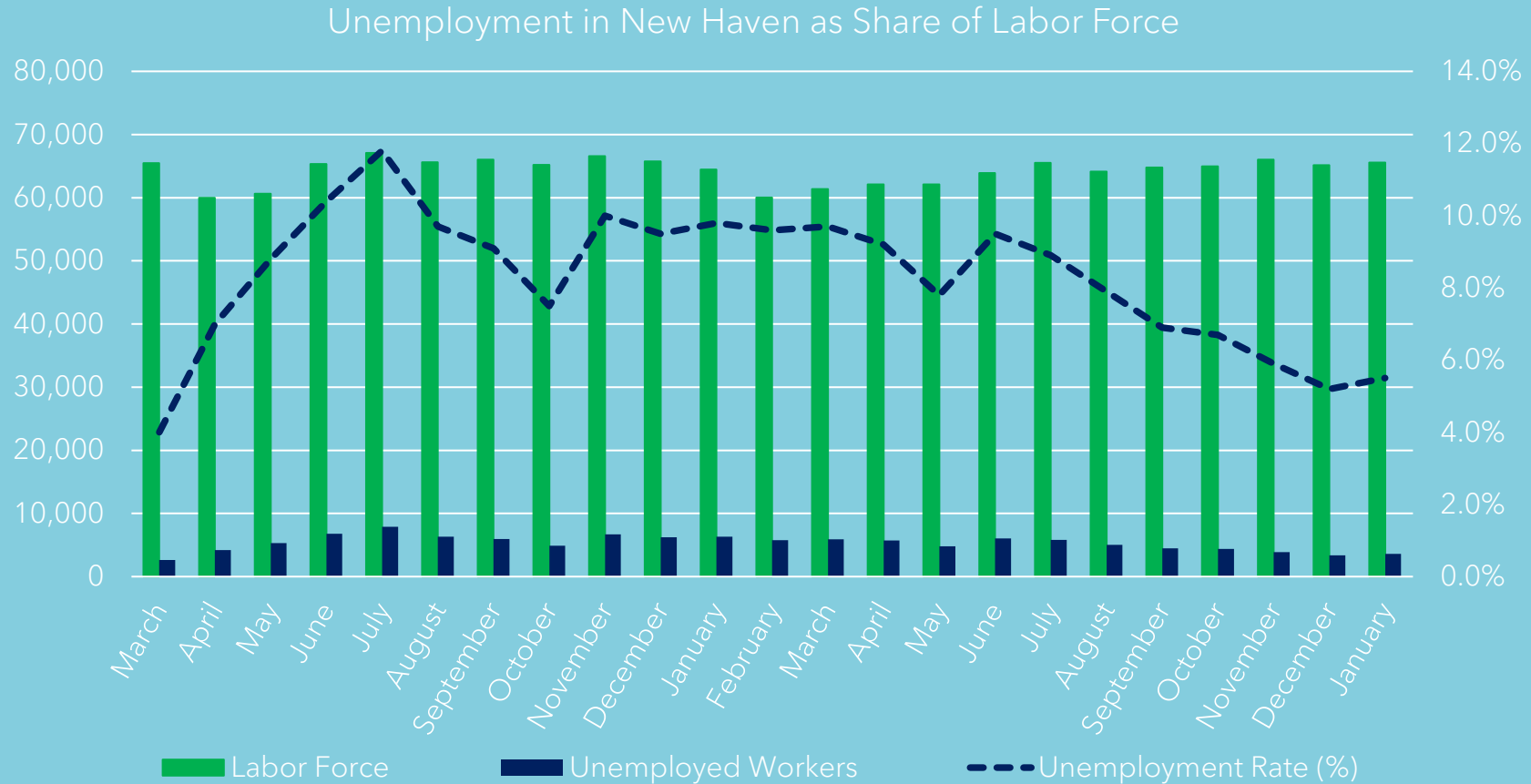

COVID-19 Employment Impact



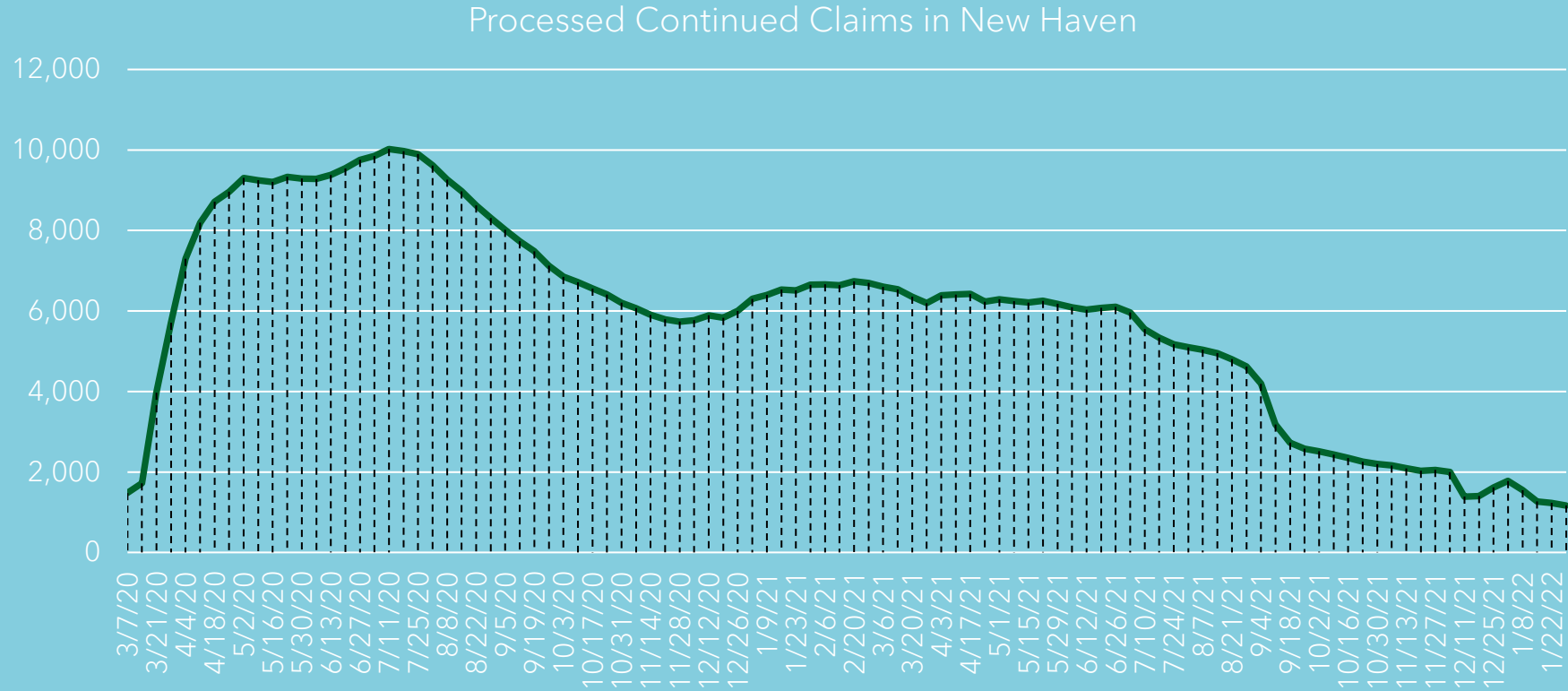

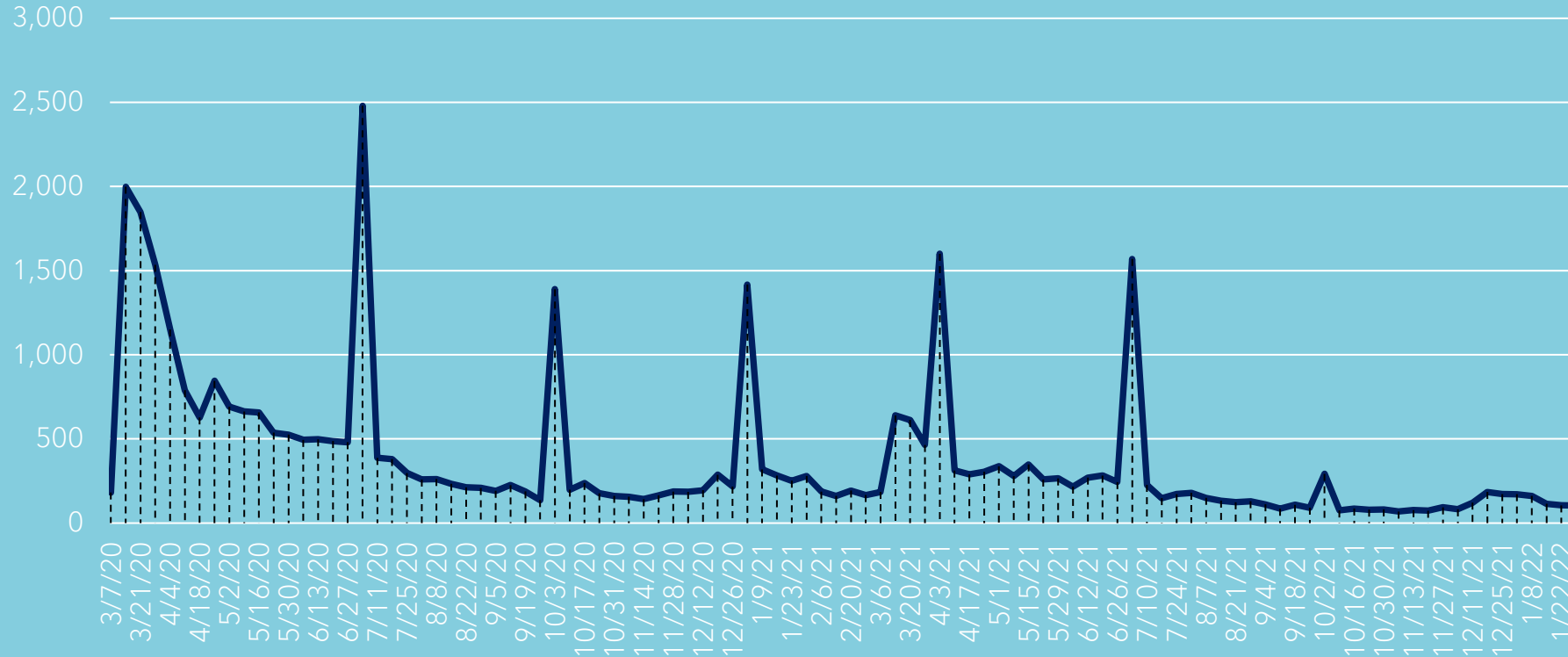

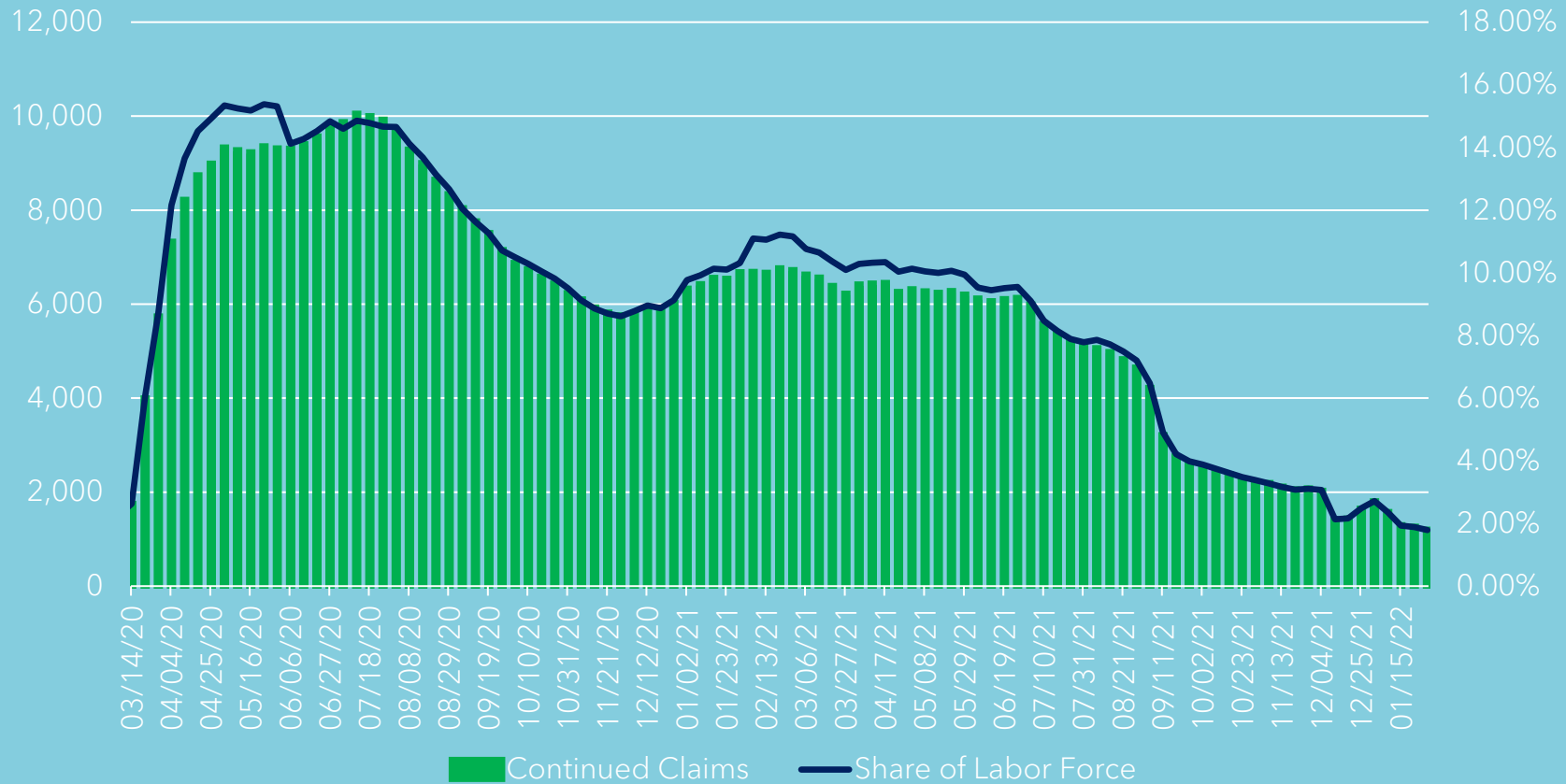
Processed Initial Claims in New Haven

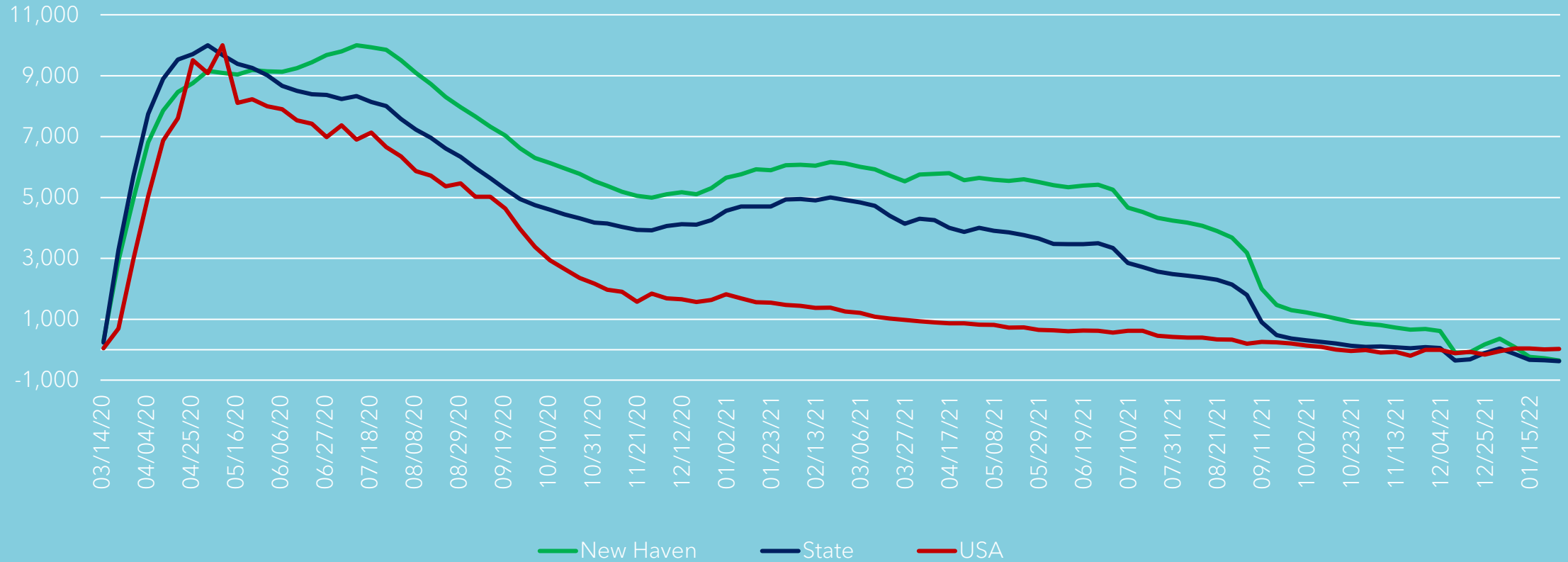

Normalized Continued Claims Trends

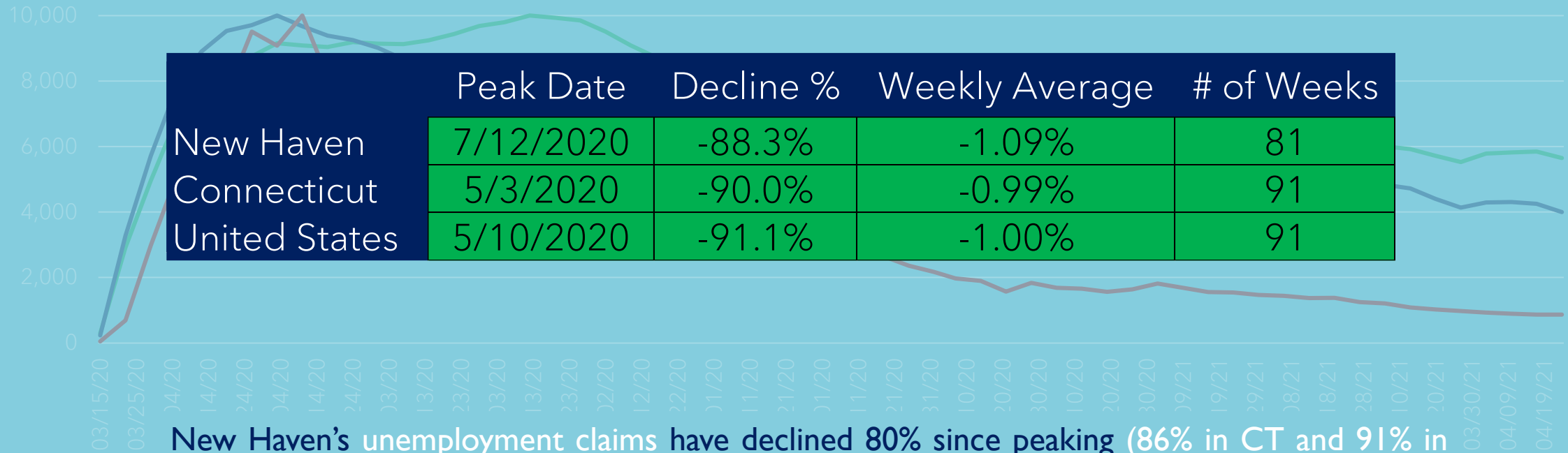

New Haven's unemployment claims have declined 80% since peaking (86% in CT and 91% in the USA) at an average rate of 1.1% per week, matching the rate of decrease across the Nation at large and slightly faster than the state.

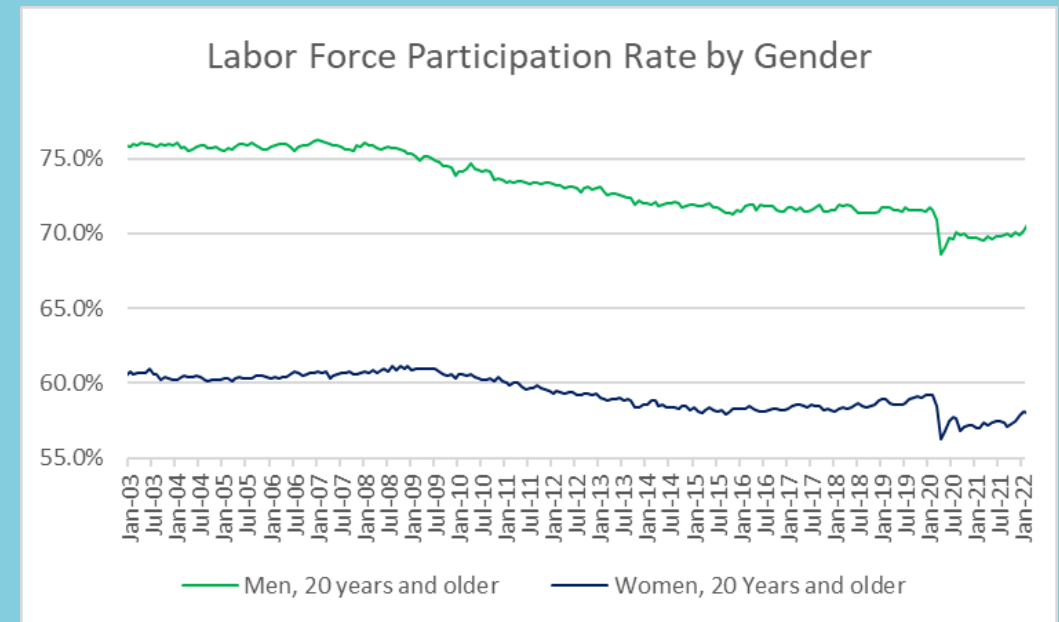
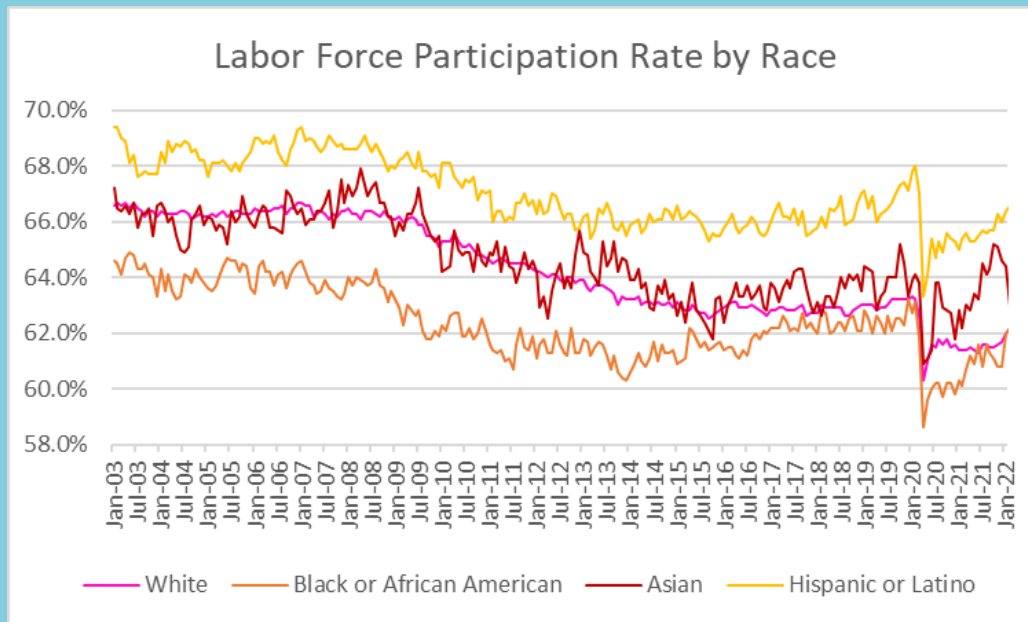

Labor Force Participation: National Insights

- The labor force participation rate increased in January (+.03%). The rate increased among Black or African Americans by a notable 1.2%, moving the rate to 62%, the same rate as White Americans which was up (.03%) as well this month. This is only the fifth month in the past 20 years where the labor force participation was equal or higher among Black or African Americans compared with White Americans. The rate increased among Latino or Hispanic Americans (.04%) and decreased among Asian Americans (-.02%).
- The labor force participation rate increased by 0.3% among women in January and increased by .03% among men.

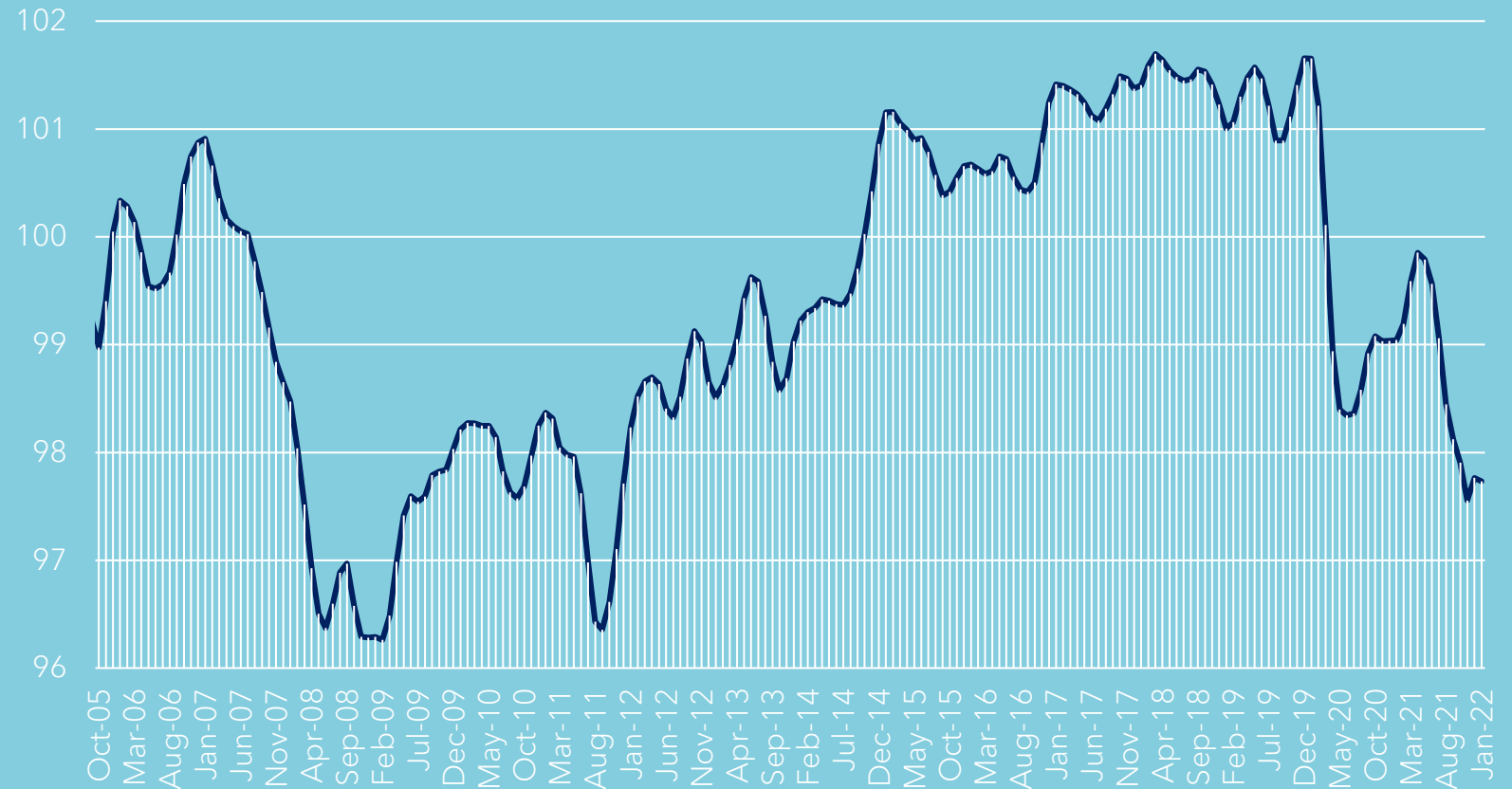


Broad Economic Impacts

Impacts on Consumer Confidence

An indicator above 100 signals a boost in the consumers' confidence towards the future economic situation, because of which they are less prone to save, and more inclined to spend money on major purchases in the next 12 months. **Values below 100 indicate a pessimistic attitude towards future developments in the economy**, possibly resulting in a tendency to save more and consume less.

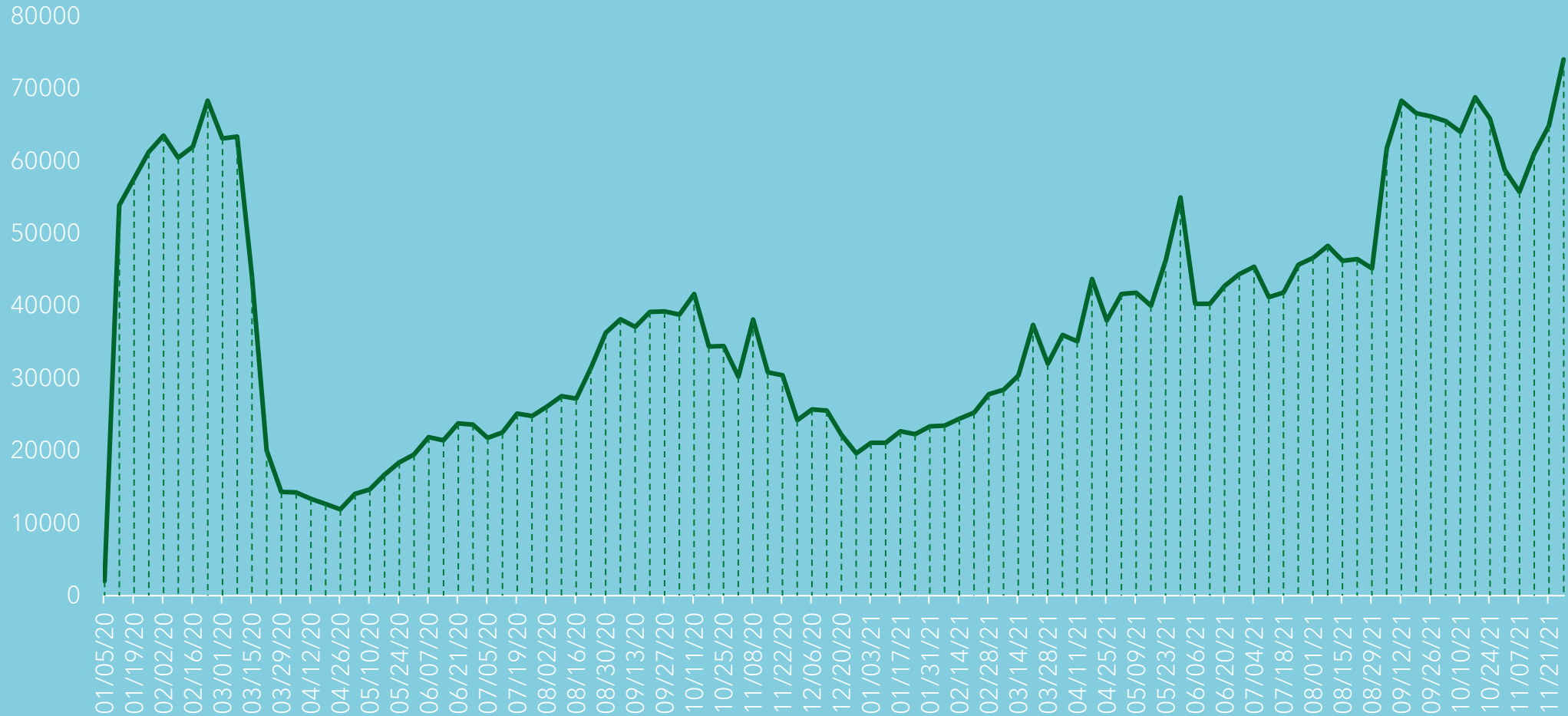
Monthly Consumer Confidence Index (CCI)

Downtown Weekly Pedestrian Traffic

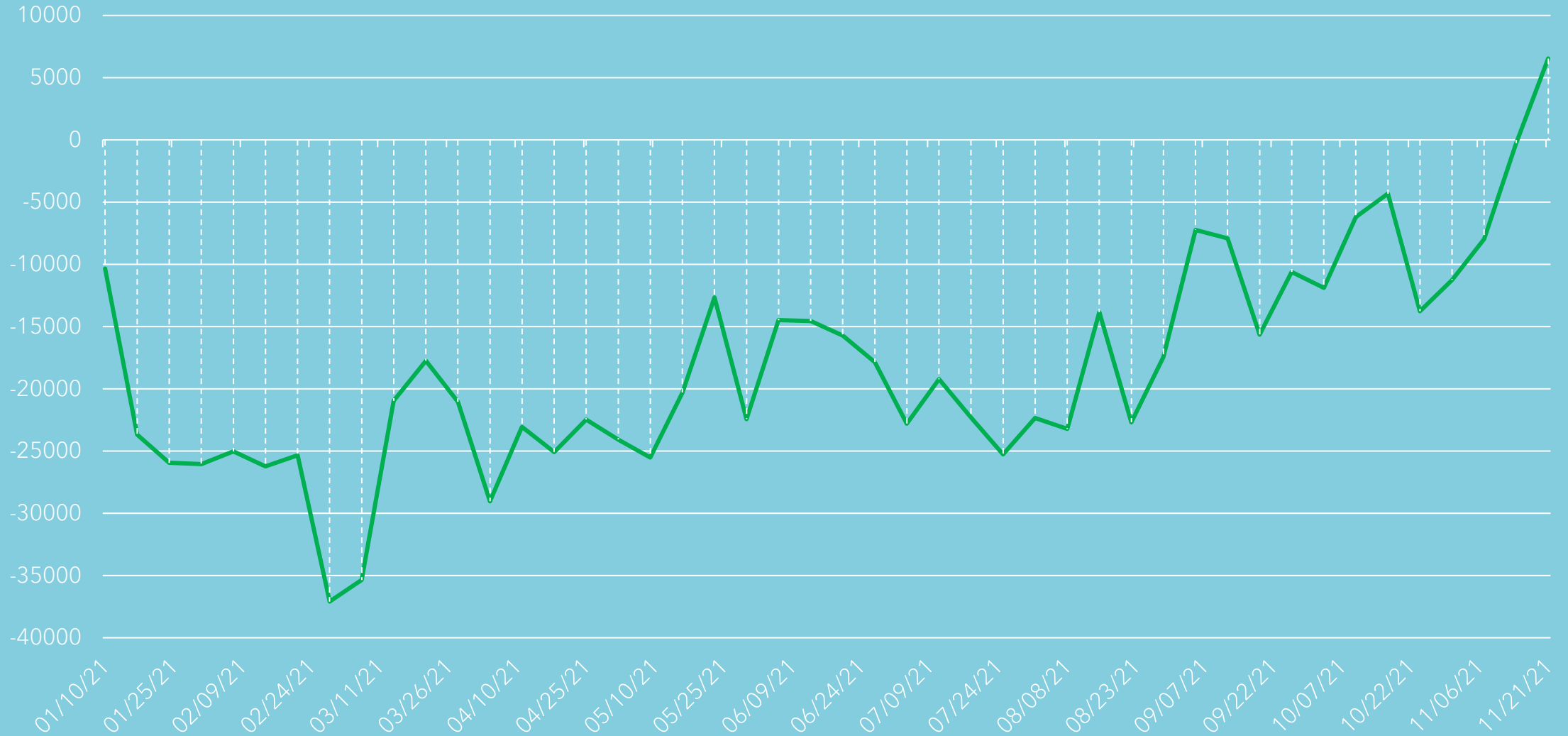

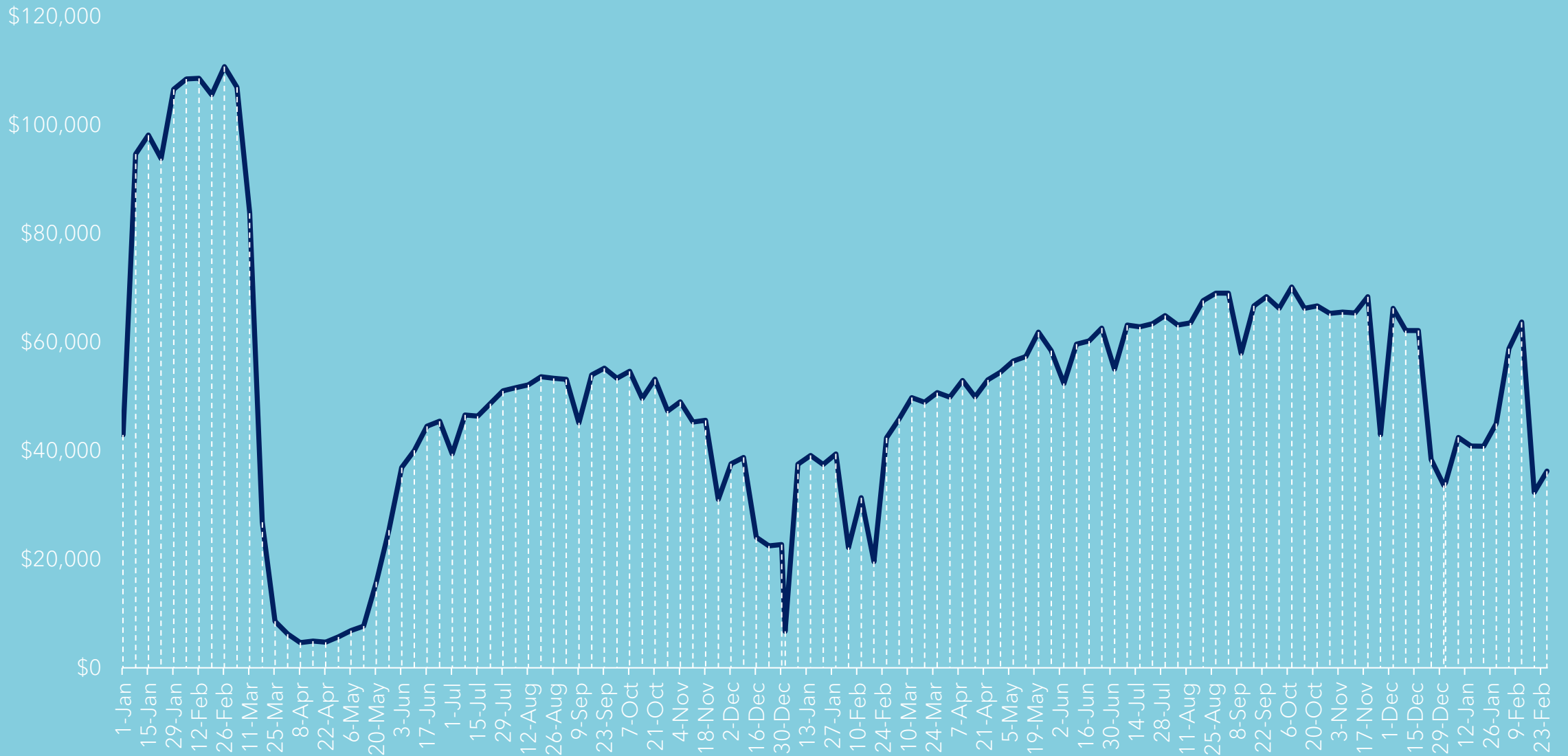
Downtown Pedestrian Traffic by Week

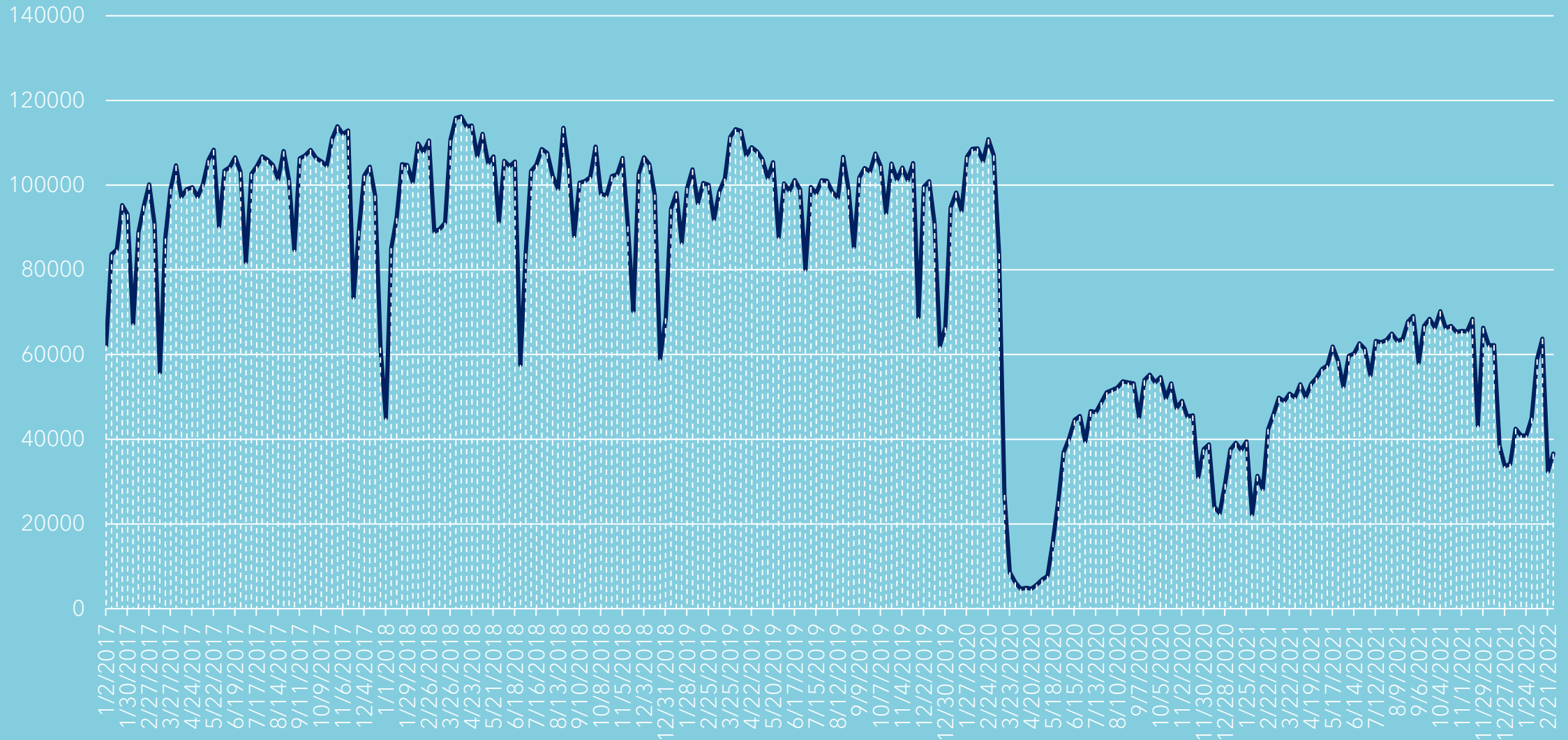
TTP Parking Revenue by Week

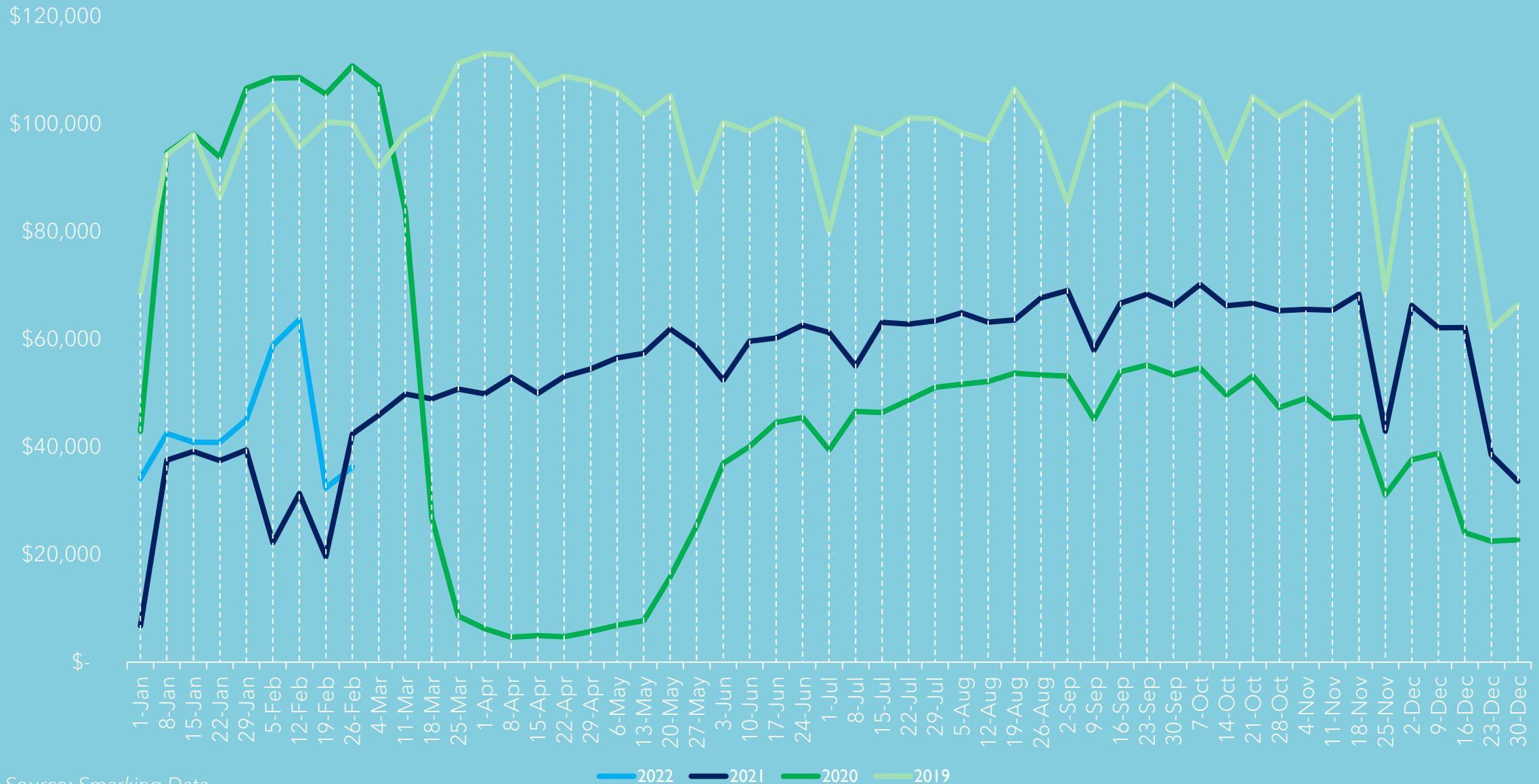
TTP Parking Revenue by Week

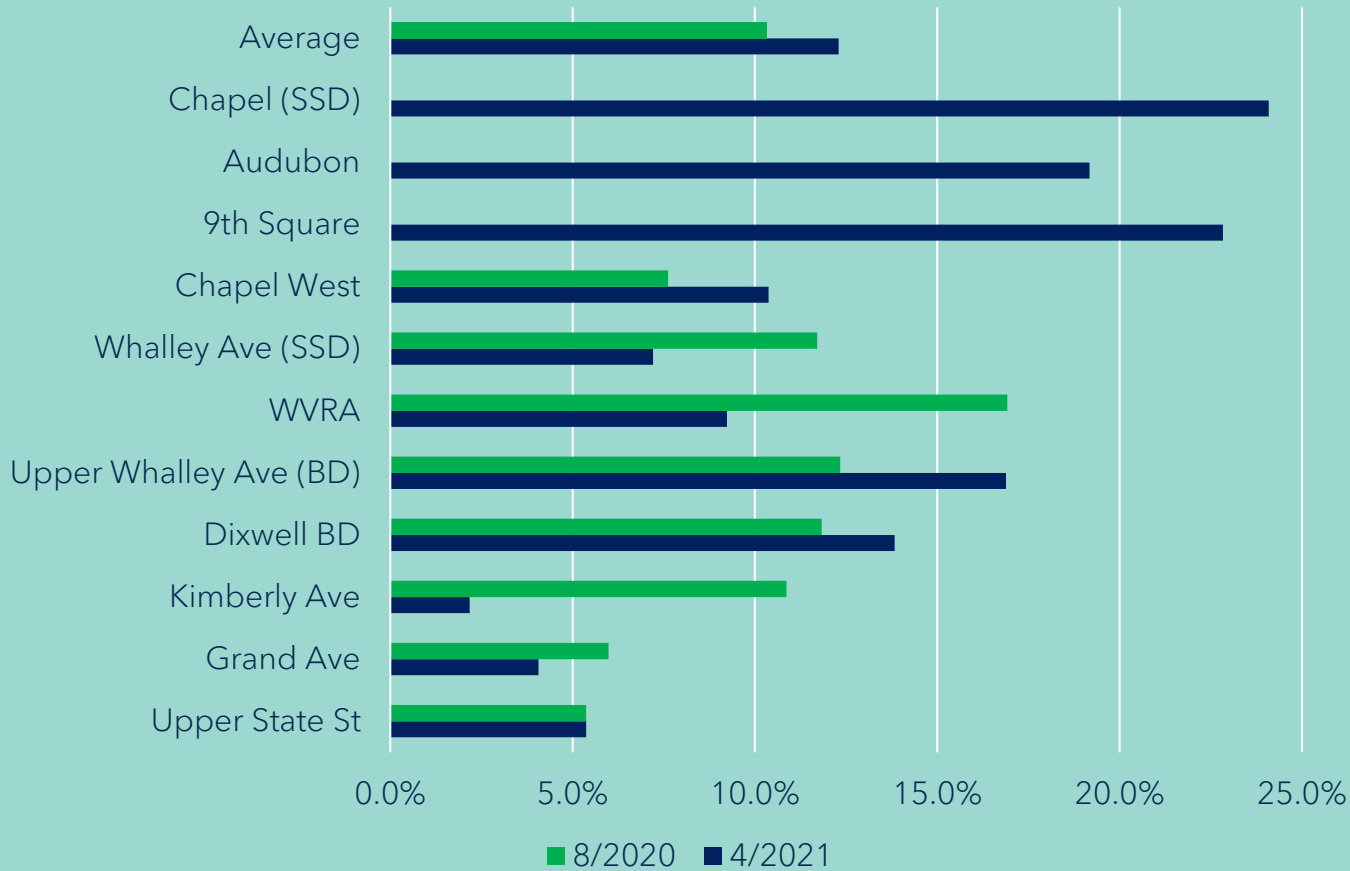

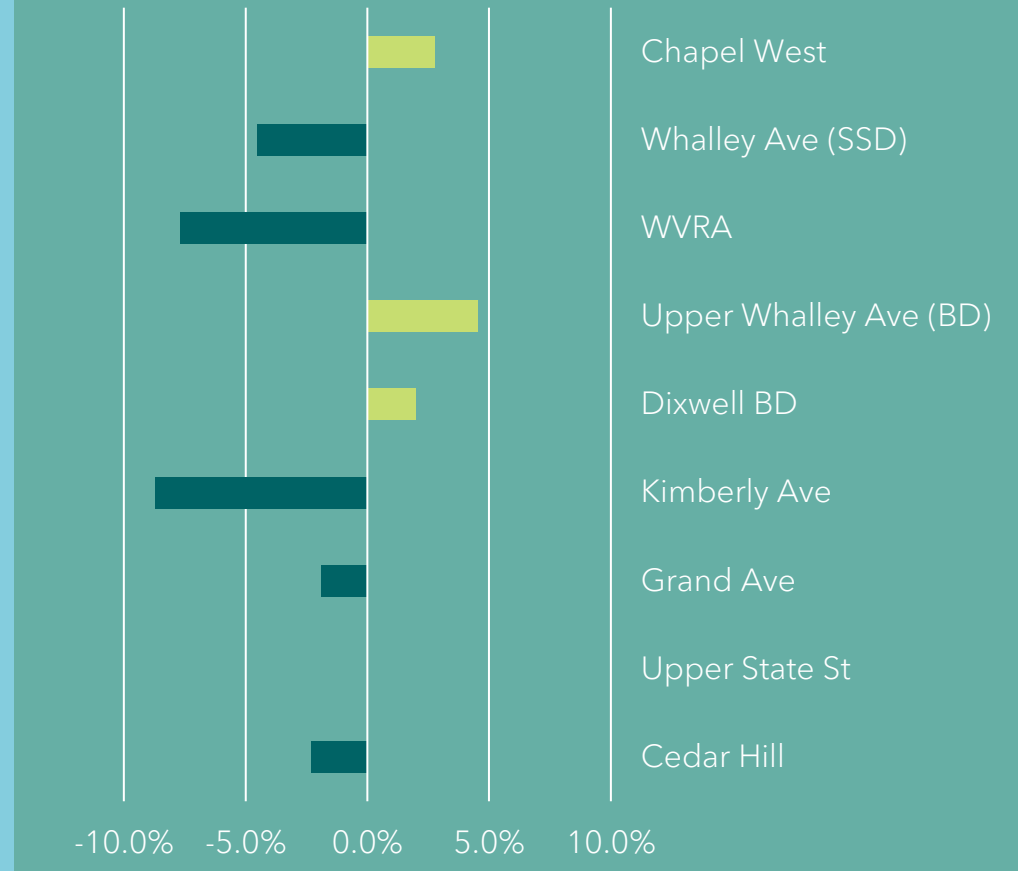

08/2020 and 04/2021

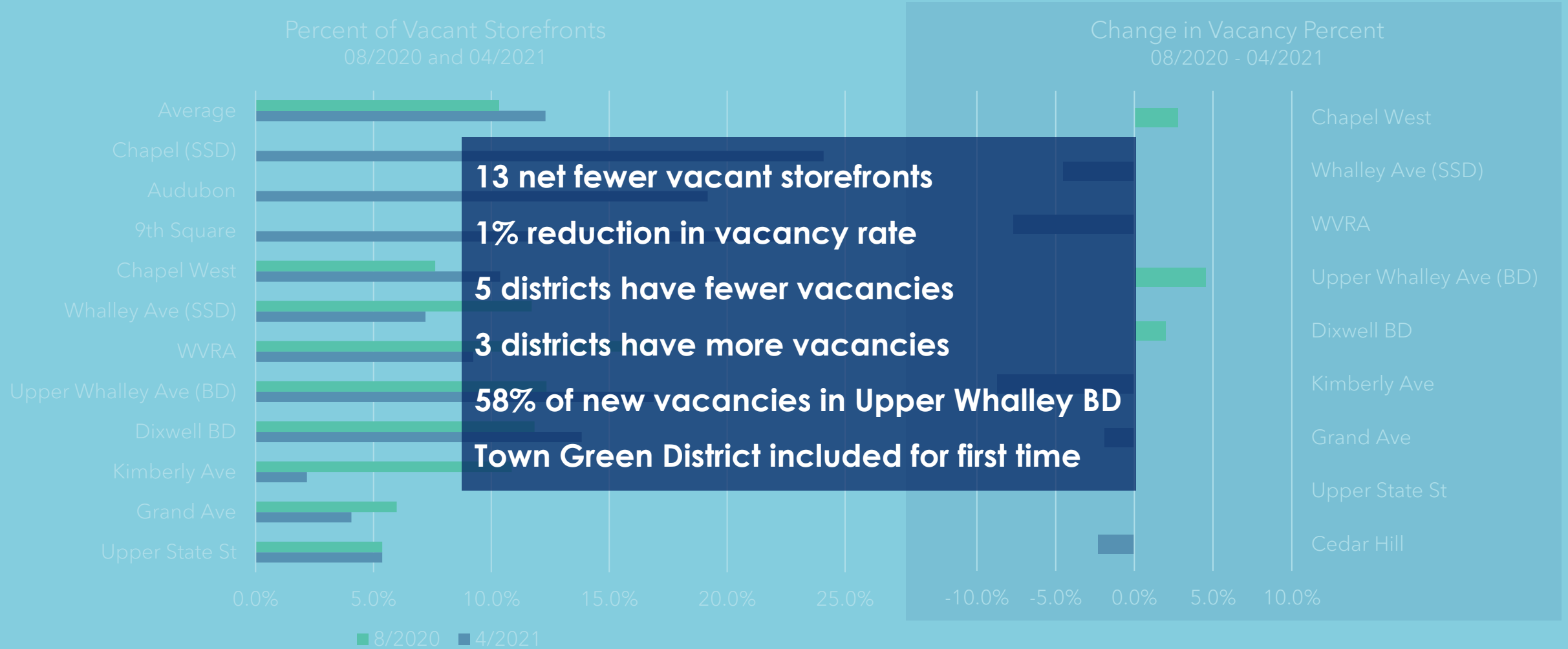


Change in Vacancy Percent

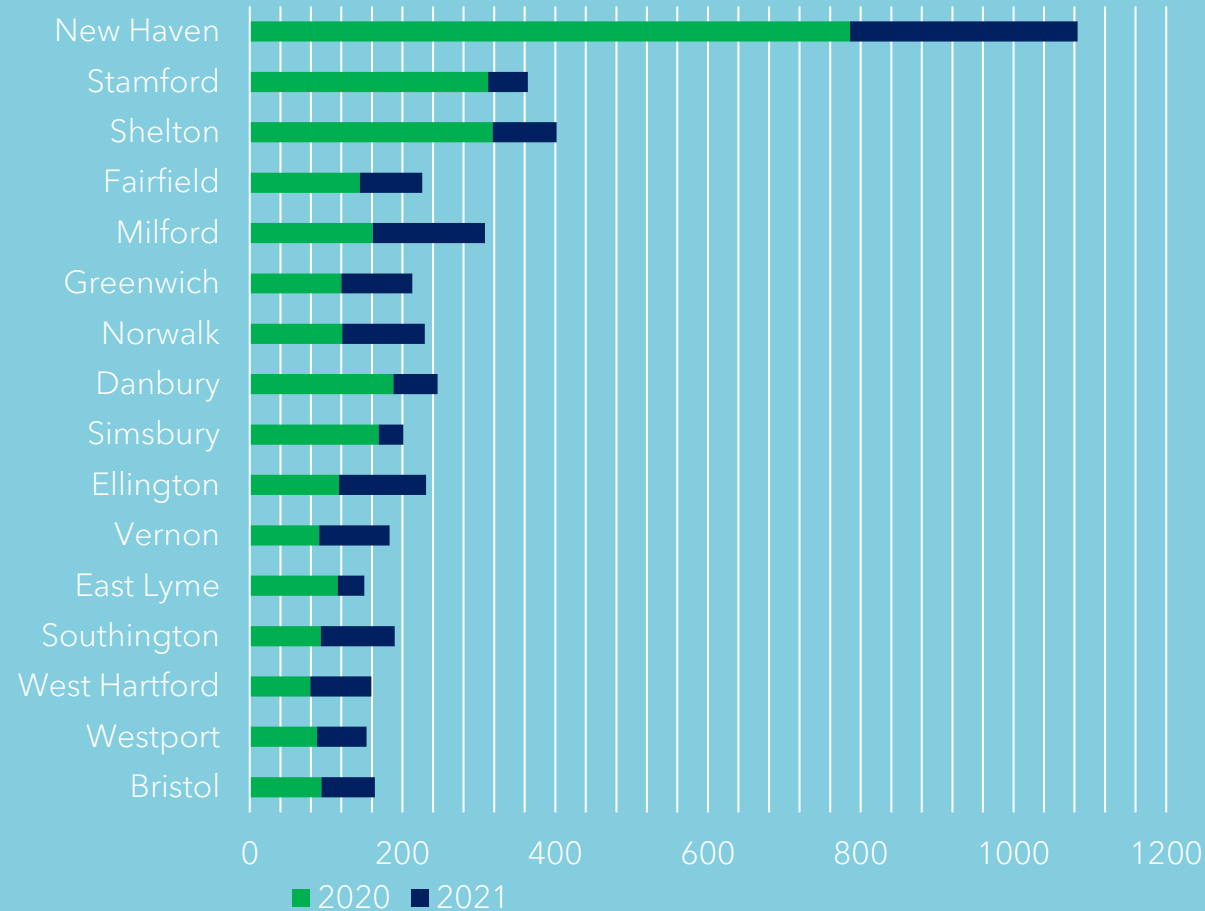

Housing Permit Activity

CT Housing Permits by Town



- New Haven leads the state with 298 housing permits in 2021.
- New Haven has had 1783 housing permits issued since 2019, the most in the state. Stamford (1451) and Shelton (505) and Milford (503) were the towns with the next highest counts.

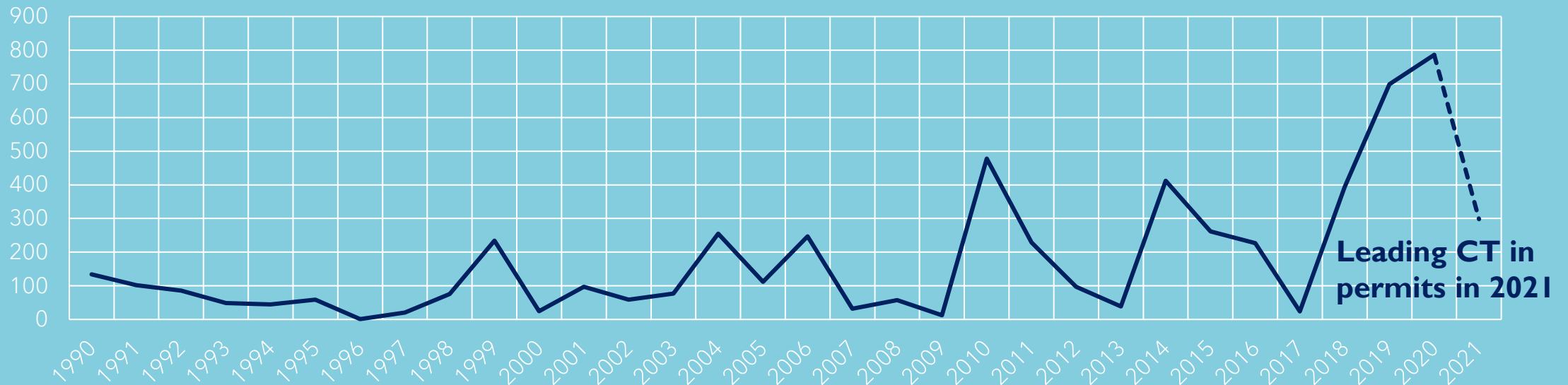
Housing Permit Activity

In the past three years (2019-2021) New Haven has granted 1,783 Housing permits. In the seven years prior to 2018 (2011-2018) New Haven granted 1,290 permits total.

Four of the top six years for housing permit activity since 1990 have occurred in the past three years. The top six have occurred this decade.

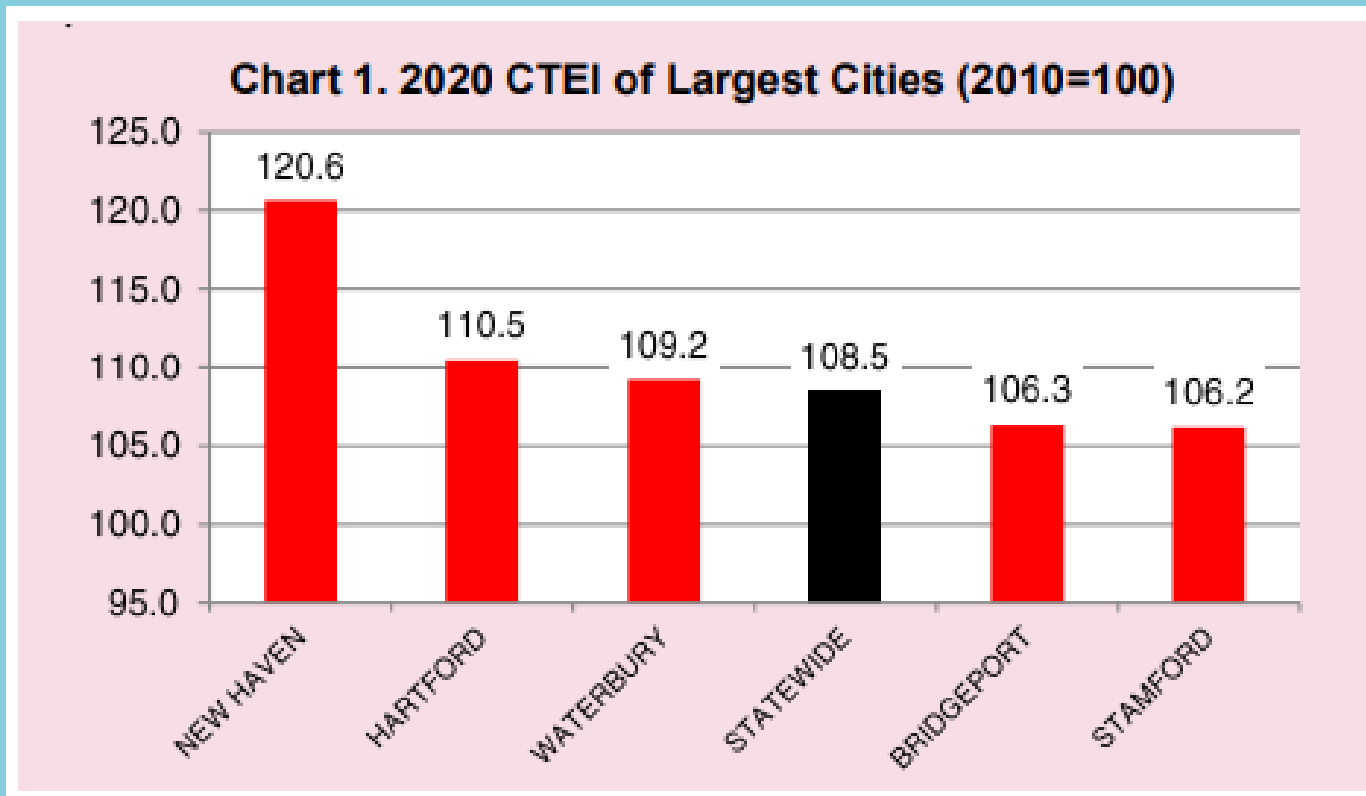

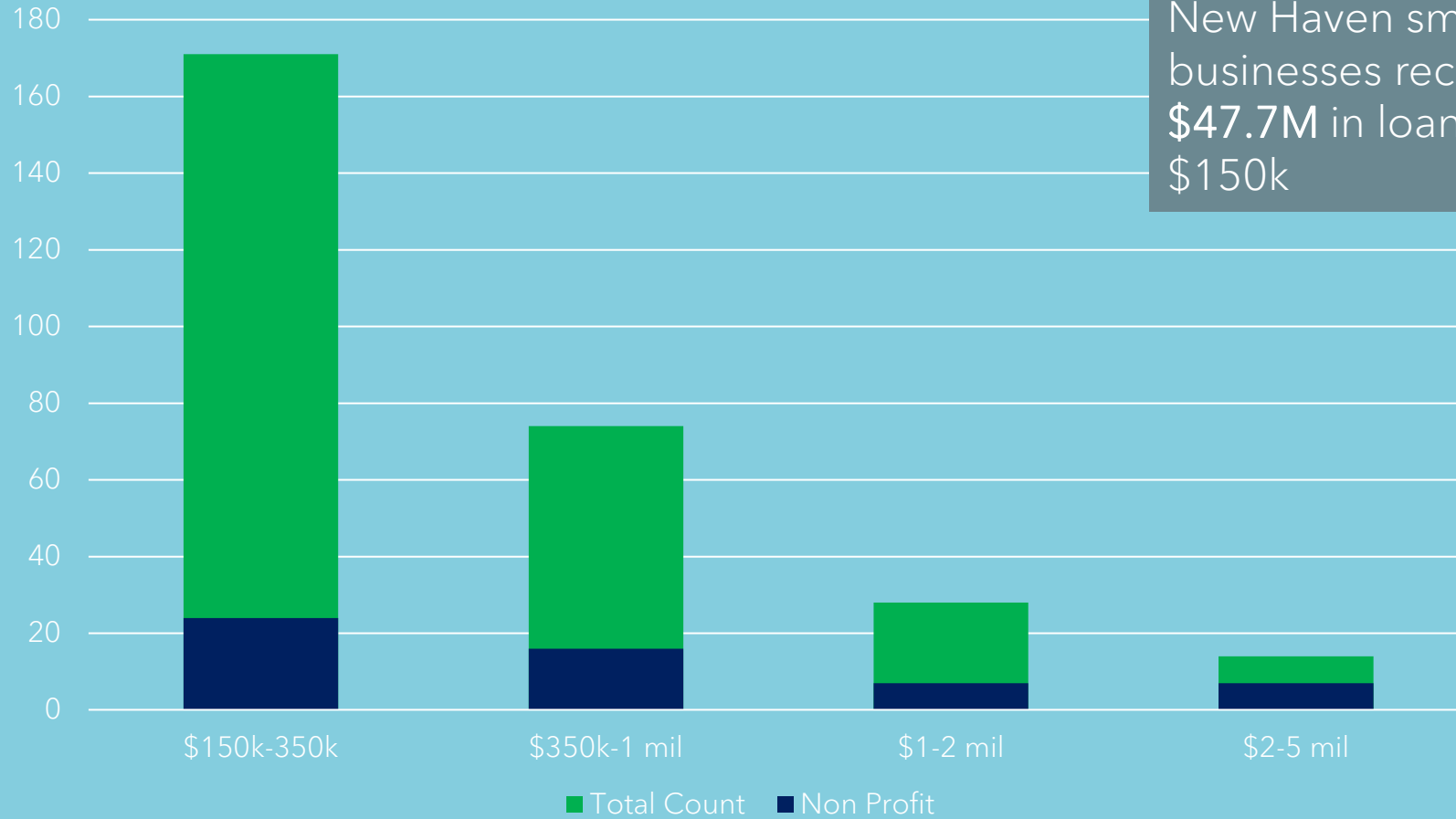
Economic Health Indicator
